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Food Security Discussion: Promising Practices by PVOs that Contributed to a Reduction in Child Stunting

After a review of final evaluation reports of Food for Peace-funded development assistance projects, the TOPS program team of technical specialists has identified a variety of promising practices among projects that demonstrated a measurable decline in stunting.

Please join us in December to discuss these promising practices for further dialogue among the food security community. Morning sessions will include a review of the promising practices, and afternoon sessions will examine key findings and recommendations from the FAFSA-2 report.

The December 5th discussion will focus on maternal and child health and nutrition, and the December 6th discussion will focus on agriculture and natural resource management. Cross-cutting aspects of gender and social and behavioral change will be discussed both days as relevant.

These events will run from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM at One Washington Circle Hotel (1 Washington Circle, Washington DC). Lunch will be provided, and we welcome you to join us at 8:30 AM for a light breakfast as well.
