### **Land O'Lakes Gender Tool Presentation & Discussion**

In this interactive session hosted by the FSN Network, Giselle Aris of Land O'Lakes International Development will present and solicit feedback on a new Land O'Lakes gender tool. She will also lead a discussion about other available tools, such as Land O'Lakes' Gender Analysis tool and Gender Training tool, as well as their internal Gender Policy.

The new gender tool is called "Integrating Gender throughout a Project's Life Cycle: A Guidance Document for International Development Organizations and Practitioners." It provides case studies, best practices, and links to external references on how to effectively integrate gender considerations not only during project design and implementation, but also during recruitment, budget development, monitoring and evaluation, communications, and staff and stakeholder training.
