



Can impact evaluations in humanitarian contexts be ethical?



#### **Ethical Concerns (Perceived)**

- Two common concerns:
  - Research activities divert funding away from life-saving aid
  - Impact evaluations require withholding programming from a group of vulnerable people

"There is normally a universal approach to coverage for humanitarian response that makes having a control group really hard. Everybody that needs attention should get it."

Impact evaluations **inform** which interventions are most cost-effective **allowing assistance to reach more** people

Impact evaluations require withholding programming from a group of vulnerable people

Impact evaluations can be designed to work within implementer targeting processes and/or **not withhold programming** from any group (e.g., A|B testing)

#### **Cost & Perceived Lack of Funding**

"They're

evaluations."

"Are you really trying to create generalizable research?
Because if so, you're going to need more money than that."

"There's no funding for [impact evaluations]. So, this raises the question of who's going to pay for it?"



Impact Evaluations can cost more than other evaluation types.



Utilizing monitoring systems and organizational capacity to lower the cost of impact evaluations.





Often an impact evaluation can be done in place of a more traditional evaluation approaches, mitigating the costs.
