DID YOU KNOW...

A third of reproductive-age women in the world are anemic, while 39% of the world's adults are overweight or obese and each year around 20 million babies are born underweight. Beyond health, slow progress on malnutrition is also impacting the social and economic development of countries. It is estimated that malnutrition in all its forms could cost society up to US\$3.5 trillion per year, with overweight and obesity alone costing US\$500 billion per year. What you need to know

Because the U.S. Congress and President Donald Trump failed to reach a budget deal, a partial government shutdown went into effect on December 22, 2018. Since then, approximately half of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) staff have been on furlough, meaning they are not allowed to report to work or access the agency's network or email. This [updated shutdown guidance](#), released by USAID on January 15, 2019, states that existing USAID-funded grants and cooperative agreements may continue to operate if they have adequate funding previously obligated. No new grant or cooperative agreement should be awarded unless necessary to support emergency activities or critical to the conduct of foreign affairs.

In a [recent statement](#), the USAID Administrator Mark Green informs that most U.S. Department of State staff will return to work as of January 20, 2019, but that this does not apply to USAID staff. In an effort to align more closely with the State Department however, USAID is consulting with the Office of Management and Budget and Congress to assess all options that would enable USAID to bring staff back to work in a paid status for restricted operations as soon as possible.

Comments due February 4, 2019

Please find the [draft Fiscal Year 2019 Request for Applications \(RFA\)](#) for development food security activities (DFSAs) in Kenya. All background and programmatic information for this solicitation can be found directly within the RFA. Comments on the FY 2019 draft RFA for Kenya are due on Monday, February 4, 2019 at noon ET.

USAID/Office of Food for Peace (FFP) is proposing a phased approach for this development activity in Kenya. The first 18-24 months will constitute a research and collaborative design phase (Phase 1), with a subsequent transition to a systems-driven implementation and institutional strengthening phase (Phase 2). As part of this approach, a Technical Steering Committee, made up of USAID staff, DFSA staff, and Government of

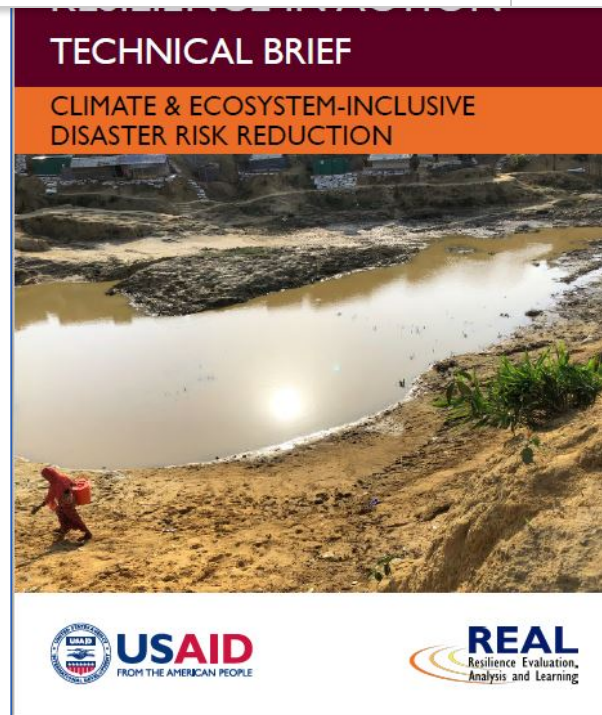

Resilience in Action Technical Brief: Climate & Ecosystem-Inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction

The *Resilience in Action Series* aims to bring development practitioners one step closer to bridging the gap between theory and practice for integrating a resilience lens in programming, answering questions such as: How does a resilience lens change the design of interventions in key sectors? How do we shift design and implementation of interventions to promote resilience-building within programs?

In this brief, we examine what is required to integrate a resilience approach to Climate & Ecosystems-Inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction (CEDRR). This approach to promoting climate and environmental sensitivity, risk reduction, and resilience capacity-building works best when applied equally to operations, staffing, and partnerships as a foundation for an enabling environment. Adopting this approach supports adaptive program design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation amidst shocks and stresses impacting communities. This framework and accompanying case studies demonstrate how a focus on resilience can promote “win-win nexus strategies”, address risk, support healthy eco-systems and sustainable livelihoods.
