The MAM'Out Project is a scientifically designed research project testing the effect multi-annual and seasonal unconditional cash transfers have on the prevention of acute malnutrition, a topic that humanitarian agencies have seldom studied. Action Against Hunger and partners have been collecting data on this topic since 2013, and this award allowed them to thoroughly analyze the data and disseminate results. They presented findings at three workshops in Burkina Faso and one in Senegal, in addition to the annual Research for Nutrition Conference in Paris and the World Health Organization's Global Health Cluster meeting in Geneva. Fundamentals of Cash Transfer Programming: An Introductory Face-to-Face Course on Cash and Voucher Programming

This course is designed for anyone who wants to learn more about cash transfer programming (CTP) in humanitarian contexts. This course will cover the fundamental definitions, terms, and principles of cash and voucher programs in humanitarian contexts. No previous knowledge of CTP is required.

By the end of the course you will be able to:

1. Define cash transfer programming, including key terminology and definitions, and state principles for good practice in CTP
2. Describe modalities, delivery mechanisms and different tools for cash transfers
3. Define the preconditions for the implementation of cash transfers
4. Explain the relevance of cash transfers in different humanitarian contexts and advocate for CTP to a variety of stakeholders
5. List the key steps and associated tasks for cash transfers in the humanitarian project cycle
6. Identify the roles and responsibilities of different staff functions in the project cycle

Pipeline and Resource Estimate Proposal (PREP) Guidance

Please find attached the final Pipeline and Resource Estimate Proposal (PREP) Guidance and pipeline analysis. These documents can also be found on the [USAID website](#). Note that this guidance was optional while out in draft, but will be mandatory as of October 1, 2017. Awards from FY 2016 and earlier can continue to break down detailed budgets by program area/element, but are encouraged to only provide this level of detail in their comprehensive budgets. Please discuss with your Agreement Officer's Representative (AOR). Even if an awardee's budget does not change, the documents required will be applicable as per the guidance. Please see a summary of major changes:

- **The M&E Plan update and the Environmental Status Report (ESR) should now be submitted in advance of the PREP, ideally at least 3 months before the anticipated PREP submission by the partners.** The plan is for these two components to be in clearance by USAID before the PREP is submitted, to permit any necessary programmatic or budget adjustments to be approved by USAID in the PREP. Please consult with your AOR about when these annual requirements would be submitted. For more information you can see the [M&E Policy and Guidance](#) or the [ESR Guidance](#).
- This new segmentation of the documentation will allow FFP and the partner to adapt the management and implementation of the award in light of any changes. In addition, it will better connect the Annual Results Report learning with future planning. This change will focus on the analytical elements of the M&E Plan update and ESR. In doing so, the logical connection of these aspects – performance and environmental monitoring, indicators, approvals – contributes to a greater effectiveness and efficiency in the process.
- The detailed budget is no longer required to be split by program area/element. The comprehensive budget should show the funds broken out by program area/element. A blank example budget will be available shortly on the [FFP website](#). Thanks to CNFA, CRS, and Mercy Corps for the use of their budgets to compile.
- Portions of the PREP, which are only required if they have been updated, have been changed to "as applicable" in the guidance.

Seed System Security Assessment: Key Trainers Course Leading to Certification

September 15, 2017 - October 7, 2017

With increased global scrutiny focused on ill-tailored or dependency-generating seed responses, Seed System Security Assessments (SSSAs) are rapidly becoming the de-facto tool in preventing misdiagnosis of seed insecurity. Seed security is now widely seen as distinct from food security and there is growing worldwide interest in this new field of SSSAs.

With increased visibility, the demand for SSSAs is rising. Seed System Security Assessments have recently been integrated into USAID guidelines and standards for best practice and organizations like Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and the UN-Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) are routinely commissioning actual field assessments. There is an urgent need to build a specialized set of experts who can lead such assessments worldwide.

This course will train in both rapid and more comprehensive forms of SSSAs. It will focus on a) analysis of all seed channels (own stocks, social networks, local networks, formal seed sellers) and b) targeted response options to deal with problems at hand. Tools will be both qualitative and quantitative (including options for automated data tallies and table formats). Methods for training will figure prominently as the aim to create a training of trainers capacity as well as to strengthen direct field assessments. Note that the focus will embrace different types of disaster, chronic stress and developmental contexts (see seedsystem.org).

Theory of Change Based Project Monitoring, Measurement, Learning and Adaptation: Guidance and Methodology


Over the past few decades, the development community has become more aware that the challenges people, communities, cities, and countries face are embedded within multiple inter-dependent and dynamic environmental, social, organizational, and political systems. Affecting change in complex environments requires a systems approach - one which looks at the interrelationships between parts of a system, as much as the parts themselves. Theory of Change (ToC) is a powerful, systems approach tool for project design, implementation, monitoring, evaluation, and learning in complex environments.

ToC has become a central project design framework for many bi- and multi-lateral institutions and foundations, including but not limited to USAID, DFID, the Gates Foundation, Annie E Casey foundation, and others. As ToC based project *design* has become more mainstream across the development community, there is a growing need for learning and sharing of best practices in ToC based project *management*, including monitoring and
